YOUR OPTIONS

There are three main options for education post-16, these are: Sixth form, College or apprenticeship

- Sixth Form either at SDCC or at a different school to study Level 3 courses either A levels or BTEC's
- Further Education Colleges do not offer A levels, however they do offer courses from entry to degree level.
- Apprenticeships are where you work with an employer usually on four days a week and one day a week you attend college or training provider. You are paid a training allowance.

If you are not sure what you want to do as a job, it is a good idea to start thinking about and completing some research to help you to decide.

UNIFROG

All students at Stoke Damerel Community College have access to Unifrog www.unifrog.org

Use your school email as your login and then ask for a password reset. You will be asked to input your email address again and then you will be sent an activation code to your school account.

Always have a plan A **AND** a plan B. For example a place to study A Levels here in the sixth form **AND** a definite confirmed place somewhere else.

If looking for an apprenticeship you do not have one until you have a CONTRACT of employment. Again have a plan B, this can be a confirmed place on a college course or a place in the sixth form.

If a college or training provider says that you can do your training with them, this is **NOT** an offer of an apprenticeship. **They will expect you to find an employer.**

SIXTH FORM LEVEL 3 QUALIFICATIONS

A level Qualifications

A levels are a full two year course.

Students are required to select **three** subjects.

Students are required to have broadly achieved GCSEs at grade 5 and higher grades in the subjects they wish to study at A level.

Level 3 BTEC

They are designed to meet the very specific needs of Universities and employers. They have a vocational focus and they are assessed through coursework and exams.

Single awards equivalent to one A level (you would need to study 2 other subjects at level 3 to have a full timetable)

Double awards equivalent to two A levels (you would need to study one other subject to have a full timetable)

Triple awards equivalent to three A levels (this is a full time table).

Extended Project

Some students choose to also complete an Extended project. This is A-level standard standalone qualification designed to extend and develop students' abilities beyond the A-level syllabus and prepare for university or their future career.

Students following a 6th form pathway usually progress onto University, Degree Level Apprenticeship or Higher Level Apprenticeships.

FURTHER EDUCATION COLLEGES

Offer full time vocational courses (based on a job or profession) they do not offer A levels there are several colleges in Plymouth with different vocational focuses.

They offer **BTEC's, T Levels** (where you spend 80% of your time at college and 20% of your time in a work placement) and **other Nationally recognised qualifications.**

In addition, if students have **not** achieved a **Grade 4** in English and maths, they will complete functional skills alongside their course to give them the equivalent.

Full time education after Year 11 is roughly classed as 20 hours a week made up from 16 taught hours with self-study making up the rest of the time.

It is **acceptable**, **even expected** to hold an offer for **several** courses for example you may have applied for a course at City College Plymouth and Discovery College.

You are able to make a final decision **once** you have received your GCSE results in August.

Don't wait to apply until you have your results as you may then not get onto the course you want to do as the courses fill up quickly.

APPRENTICESHIPS

What are they and how do they work?

An apprenticeship is where you are **employed** and have a **contract of employment** and have **paid holidays.**

You work with the employer for **80%** of your time. For the other **20%** of your time you complete training either online or by attending a **training centre or college.**

Some employers send their apprentices to college full time for the first year of their training, whilst others send their apprentices to college one day a week.

Levels?

There are different levels and you usually need to have GCSE English and maths at a Grade 4 to apply but this is not always the case.

If you do not achieve Grade 4 in English and maths you will complete **Functional Skills** in literacy and numeracy.

After Year 11 students can apply for the following levels of apprenticeships:

- Level 2 Intermediate Apprenticeship A level 2 apprenticeship is often referred to as an intermediate level apprenticeship
- Level 3 Advanced Apprenticeship A level 3 apprenticeship is known as an advanced apprenticeship. A Level 3 would be considered to be the same as 2 passes at A-Level.

Where to find opportunities?

You can look for apprenticeships in different ways:

- Larger employers advertise on their own websites where they have details of apprenticeships with their other vacancies.
- The National Apprenticeship Service a website advertising current vacancies www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship

- Use your network, ask family and friends if they know of anywhere looking for an apprentice, but follow this up and have a proper conversation with a job offer.
- Plymouth Makes all the local manufacturing companies are listed and advertise their vacancies.

TRAINEESHIPS

- A course that includes a work placement that will get you ready for an apprenticeship or a job. You'll get work experience and some help to apply for your next steps.
- You can also improve your maths and English skills. You'll get work experience and some help to apply for whatever you do next.
- You'll spend a minimum of 70 hours in a work placement with the rest of your time in college or a training centre

Duration: 6 weeks to 1 year

Offered by colleges and training providers that provide apprenticeship training.

HOW TO APPLY FOR JOBS AND APPRENTICESHIPS?

When applying for an apprenticeship or a job many employers ask for a CV.

A CV is a short, written summary of your skills, achievements and experience which relate to a role you want. You use it in the first stage of applying for jobs. Employers often ask for a CV instead of an application form but sometimes you'll need both.

It's your first chance to promote yourself to an employer. A good CV will get you to an interview. Use it to apply for advertised jobs, or to introduce yourself to employers you'd like to work for. They may have vacancies that aren't advertised.

You should always have a cover letter to go with a CV.

A **cover letter** introduces you to an employer and asks them to think about your application.It's a short letter, **3 to 5 paragraphs**, that you should send with your CV or application form.

You should always include a cover letter when you apply for a job using a CV. You can write it as an email if you're applying online, or print a copy to go with a paper application.

'STAR' TECHNIQUE

When completing application forms use the 'STAR' technique.

The STAR ('Situation, Task, Action, Result') technique is a recognised format used in applications and interviews to answer competency-based questions like "tell me about a time you solved a problem to a tight timescale".

Using this method to answer interview questions allows the applicant to provide strong examples of proof that you possess the experience and skills for the apprenticeship.

Situation

Explain a recent challenge or situation that relates to the question

Task

Describe the tasks, objectives and targets relevant to the situation

Action

Describe the action taken to complete the tasks and objectives, why those actions were taken and what the alternatives were

Result

Explain the outcome of the situation, for example what objectives and targets were met

Don't forget to describe key learnings from the situation and how they have been used since.

Usually if you have completed a good application or CV with a covering letter you will be invited in for an interview.
