1	<p>Risk - Likelihood of an environment, activity and/or resource causing harm.</p> <p>Hazard - Potential for an environment, activity and/or resource causing harm.</p> <p>Risk assessment - A process of evaluating what might cause harm to people (the potential risks) and making sure things are in place to manage the risk and prevent harm</p>	<p>Children 0-18 months-explore by putting everything in their mouths. This is known as 'mouthing'.</p> <p>Children aged 18 months to 3 years-often take part in what is known as exploratory play, which consists of gross motor skills such as opening and closing doors. Which means that adults need to manage risks such as trapped fingers.</p> <p>Children aged 3-5 years-become more independent in their play and seek opportunities to play away from adults</p>

2	<p>British lion mark-indicates that toys have been tested</p> <p>Age advice symbol-means that this toy is not suitable for a child between 0-3 years</p> <p>CE mark-a declaration by toy manufacturer that the toy is safe</p> <p>BSI Kitemark-indicates that the safety requirements have been met</p> <p>Fire resistant symbol-item have passed scientific control test to show they are resistant to fire</p>

3	<p>Positive risk taking - Balancing the potential risk of harm against the benefit of children participating in activities.</p> <p>Adult to child ratio- The number of adults to the number of children</p>	<p>Rather than being over concerned with safety adults should allow children to explore and play. STEP 2: CREATE CUES

What: Reduce your notes to just the essentials.

What: Immediately after class, discussion, or reading session.

How:

- Jot down key ideas, important words and phrases
- Create questions that might appear on an exam
- Reducing your notes to the most important ideas and concepts improves recall. Creating questions that may appear on an exam gets you thinking about how the information might be applied and improves your performance on the exam.

Why: Spend at least ten minutes every week reviewing all of your previous notes. Reflect on the material and ask yourself questions based on what you've recorded in the Cue area. Cover the note-taking area with a piece of paper. Can you answer them?

STEP 1: RECORD YOUR NOTES

What: Record all keywords, ideas, important dates, people, places, diagrams and formulas from the lesson. Create a new page for each topic discussed.

When: During class lecture, discussion, or reading session.

How:

- Use bullet points, abbreviated phrases, and pictures
- Avoid full sentences and paragraphs
- Leave space between points to add more information later

Why: Important ideas must be recorded in a way that is meaningful to you.

STEP 3: SUMMARISE & REVIEW

What: Summarise the main ideas from the lesson.

What: At the end of the class lecture, discussion, or reading session.

How: In complete sentences, write down the conclusions that can be made from the information in your notes.

Why: Summarising the information after it's learned improves long-term retention.
