Lord Chief Justice gives students a valuable insight into law as a career

The College was delighted to welcome Lord Chief Justice, The Right Honourable Lord Ian Burnett of Maldon to the school to talk to 25 of our students about his role as the Head of the Judiciary of England and Wales and to discuss law as a career.

The Lord Chief Justice also held a question-and-answer session with the students, from Year 10 going into Year 11 and Year 12 going into Year 13. He was joined by District Tribunal Judge Julia O'Hara and District Judge Penelope Taylor for the 45-minute event on 29 June.

Miss Frier said: "This event was a wonderful opportunity for our students, and we are very grateful to the Lord Chief Justice for sharing his experience and advice. We have several students who have expressed an interest in law, and this has given them a real insight into what an important and rewarding career it can be. Hopefully, it will have inspired others, too."



MP Luke Pollard answers students' questions on diversity and inclusion

The College was hugely indebted to our local MP Luke Pollard for visiting us to take part in our Diversitas and LGBTQ+ group meeting.

Mr Pollard, who is the Labour MP for Plymouth Sutton and Devonport, was invited to the College on 28 May to answer questions from students around issues of diversity, equity and inclusion. He was also very generous in sharing his own experiences of growing up in Plymouth and of becoming the city's first ever openly gay MP.



Afterwards, the MP praised the College for setting up the Diversitas group and complimented the students on the questions they put to him: "It was great to see how passionate they are to help make the College and the wider community as inclusive as possible. And it's good to see the College doing such great work on this."

Diversitas, which was launched last September, is working towards engendering a College-wide attitude of inclusion and acceptance of everybody. The group is open to all students to join.

Year 12s hit the back of the net with their leadership skills

Well done to our Year 12 Btec students for the brilliant coaching session and football tournament they led with our Year 7s on Sports Day.

The two-hour session was part of Year 12s Btec course work. Staff were extremely impressed with their leadership and coaching skills, and with the positive way that our Year 7s responded.

Celebrating our seas on Oceans Day

Stoke Damerel Community College has held a special Oceans Day, with Year 7, 8 and 9 students taking part in a carousel of ocean-themed lessons.

The purpose of the day was to inform students of the impact that human actions have on our seas. It followed the second fully virtual celebration of the United Nations' World Oceans Day on 8 June 2021, which this year highlighted the theme of The Ocean:Life and Livelihoods.

In The Street at lunchtime, marine artifacts were put on display for students and staff to view.

Miss Heseltine said: "The aim of the day was to illustrate to students the huge role that oceans play in our everyday life, as a critical part of the biosphere. The oceans are the lungs of the planet, and they are a major source of food and medicine. And yet they are increasingly at risk because of human actions.

"We are very fortunate that we live by the sea in Plymouth and get the chance to enjoy it. One of the messages from Oceans Day is that we can all play a part in looking after it not just for now, but for the future."

to the Y7s. Lots of the Y7s are now really keen to get involved with football clubs both in- and outside of school, which is testament to the hard work and enthusiasm of our football leaders!

In the morning, there was a Medical Mavericks online work experience session, and students were also able to spend time working on their Unifrog profiles, which will help them with their university applications and CVs.

In the afternoon, Richard Blackmore from Babcock International attended the College to talk to students in the Main Hall about how business can ensure diversity and inclusion and what this means on a day-to-day basis

Richard is our Enterprise Adviser and the College's Careers Link Governor - he is also a former student here. He told students: "In our business, we aim to attract and retain a diverse group of individuals and create an inclusive environment for them to thrive. This makes us better as a business as our employees can bring their whole selves to work along with unique ideas and perspectives. Embracing difference gives us the best opportunity to succeed."



"At GCSE, some of our students achieved the top grade 9's in a number of subjects and all students have aspirational plans for Post 16. We are very proud of them all."

Helping students to kick-start a career in the sports industry

Students in Year 9 and Year 12 have been learning about the wide range of roles within the sports industry, and the types of degree courses that are available to help kick-start a career in the booming multi-billion pounds sector.

Andy Speed, Regional Recruitment
Manager at University Campus of
Football Business (UCFB), spent the
day at the College talking to BTEC
Sport and Coaching students. In
England, UCFB has two locations
with Wembley Stadium and
Manchester City's Etihad Stadium
at the heart of their campuses.
Globally, UCFB also has campuses at
major sports venues in the US and
at the Melbourne Cricket Ground in
Australia

The students learnt that having a specialism within the sports industry could open up exciting opportunities not just in the UK, but overseas. In

the EU alone, there are 1.7 million people working in the sector - 55% male and 45% female.

The students also discovered that there is much, much more to a longterm career in the sports industry than just on the playing side. Sports specialism courses at UCFB cover three main areas - physical education, coaching, management and talent development; stadium and events management; and professional services such as sports journalism, broadcasting, marketing, finance and law. Courses are at Foundation, Degree and Masters' levels and are delivered together with the University of East London.

Mr Speed also highlighted the strength of the sector: "The sports industry is a huge player in the UK economy in terms of revenue generation and in terms of the



number of people who follow sport. So it is a fantastic sector to get into."

The day was organised by our Careers and Employability Manager, Miss Trezona. She said: "The sports industry is an expanding and thriving sector to work in, and it involves a lot of varied specialisms - I think the types of roles might have been an eye-opener. I am sure that hearing about these exciting career opportunities will have inspired some to look at the courses that are available and consider the qualifications that will give them an advantage if they choose a career in this industry."

EGX EuroGamer Convention Trip

The Computing department launched the trip to the EGX EuroGamer Convention in London last week.

The 50 spaces were booked in less than 24 hours so another 50 spaces were added. These were also snapped up and are now fully booked.
